LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

We started the year 2022 in high spirits but the covid-19 spike made it difficult to continue with our plans. However, the only option we had was to keep moving with new strength. With safety measures in place and the utmost precautions, we did our programming with married and out-of-school girls.

From March onwards, we were able to go back to schools with our programming, apprehensive yet excited. After a long wait, we did the Her Turn and His Chance education and empowerment program in the Jumla district along with a continuation of similar programming in the Sindhupalchowk and Kavre districts. In total, 648 adolescents graduated from the program.

Her Turn – a grassroots movement with and by adolescent girls has completed a decade. What started as a small project in 2012 is now our flagship program that graduated 7752 adolescent girls and 2147 boys. On the 74th International Human Rights Day, we celebrated ten years of Her Turn inviting our graduates, teachers, mentors, and well-wishers to the 6th Annual Girl-led leadership conference; partnership with boys. Thanks to everyone for traveling to Kathmandu to celebrate, reflect and support what we have been doing.

We are always grateful to be a part of a community that celebrates and encourages women and girl-led leadership. CORE PROGRAMS

A. HER TURN EDUCATION AND EMPOWERMENT PROGRAM

Her Turn Education and Empowerment Program is one of the core programs of Hamro Palo provided to adolescent girls of age 12–16 years. It is with great excitement we share that we were able to conduct the Her Turn Program for a total of 594 students from different schools and districts of Nepal this year. In 2022, we had the privilege to work with a total of twelve community schools in different districts like Kavrepalanchowk, Jumla, and Sindhupalchowk.





The program was especially focused educating. on empowering, and equipping the young girls with the knowledge of basic health issues such as hygiene. menstruation. and nutrition, safety issues such as domestic violence, sexual abuse, human trafficking. and early marriage, and also enhancing leadership skills their by providing them with the life skills needed to lead one's own lives. By the end of the Her Turn Program, the participants were able to acquire leadership skills, and their needs and also be informed about several health and safety issues.

"I came to know how child marriage affects the health of the adolescent mother as it increases the risk of complications during pregnancy and childbirth. I am now able to raise the voice against it if I see anybody involved in early marriage in my community."

B. HIS CHANCE EDUCATION AND EMMPOWERMENT PROGRAM

Understanding the need of including adolescent boys in the conversation of girl leadership and empowerment, His Chance Education and Empowerment Program was conducted for a total of 54 adolescent boys of Shree Sita Secondary School, Jumla.



A week-long 'His Chance' Program provided an excellent opportunity for the team to make the adolescent boys understand their role as allies to address the power inequalities in the school, families, and community to achieve gender equality. The workshop was facilitated by the local trainers who are provided with Training of Trainers (ToT) prior to the workshop conducted for adolescent boys which primarily covered health issues, safety issues, and enhancing leadership skills.

B. HIS CHANCE EDUCATION AND EMPOWERMENT PROGRAM

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"This is the first time that education and empowerment workshops have been conducted in my school. After participating in this workshop, I got information about many important topics like menstruation, child marriage, and eve-teasing. I used to tease girls at school, now I learned that teasing is a form of harassment and I will speak up if I see anybody doing the same."

"Before attending Training of Trainers, I felt shy to talk about menstruation but after becoming a part of ToT and workshop, I felt confident to teach and talk about menstruation. In our society, there is a myth about menstruation. If any male talks about menstruation, people judge them negatively which is why they are not open to talking about such issues but now I don't feel hesitant to talk and teach about menstruation to anyone."

CORE PROGRAMS

C. SNEH PROGRAM - FOR MARRIED AND OUT OF SCHOOL GIRLS AND YOUNG MOTHERS

As the young mothers are often deprived of such workshops and needful knowledge regarding family planning, health, safety, family planning, mental well being, financial literacy, it becomes very crucial to educate and equip them with the skills and knowledge required to help them tackle the consequences resulting from early marriage.



In 2022, the team worked with a total of 54 young mothers from two communities in the Kavrepalanchowk district. By conducting this 15-day long workshop delivered by the local trainers, it provided them the opportunity to learn about mental health issues, health issues, safety issues, and even about financial literacy in a very comfortable training environment.

C. SNEH PROGRAM - FOR MARRIED AND OUT OF SCHOOL GIRLS AND YOUNG MOTHERS

"I got married at the age of 20, now I am 22 years old and 5 months pregnant. I was unaware of breastfeeding and the proper diet. This workshop taught me to do regular exercises to make delivery easy and do regular check-ups. She added, "all the learned knowledge was very important in our day-to-day life. I will definitely share all the learned lessons with my friends and family. Topic related to stress where I learned about the way to overcome stress was totally new and interesting for me."

D. ANNUAL GIRL-LED LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE

This year marked 10 years of Her Turn Movement. On the occasion of completing the 10 years journey of working with and for adolescent girls, Hamro Palo organized the 6th Annual Girl-led Leadership Conference in partnership with the boys on 10th December 2022, in Kathmandu. The conference consisted of a brief celebration of 10 years of Her Turn Movement, along with the women-led panel discussion and honoring Her Turn Leadership Award Winners. There was the active participation of 143 participants from different community schools of Sindhupalchowk, Gorkha, and Kavrepalanchowk, and even the participation of school representatives from diverse backgrounds and schools from different areas of Nepal was encouraging for all of us. D. ANNUAL GIRL-LED LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE

In addition to this, the panel discussion was conducted on the 'Women Leadership- Present and Future' theme with the main objective of shedding light on the present and future of women's leadership, power, and the importance of women's leadership. The panelists were adolescent girls and women from diverse backgrounds working as a changemaker in different areas of development like education, and politics for the welfare of society,



The panelists were Ms. Maya Gurung, the first female of the Gurung Community to climb Mt. Everest and also a member of Seven Summit and also a candidate for House of Representative from Sindhupalchowk- 2, Ms. Srijana Tamang, a mentor, trainer, and a social mobilizer at Hamro Palo who is actively contributing in educational reforms in the community by closely working with the schools of her community. Similarly, the other two panelists were the young adolescent girls, Ms. Kabita Khadka and Ms. Salina Shrestha who are the graduates of Her Turn Program and are doing exceptionally well in their community by spreading awareness on issues like child marriage, gender-based violence, and domestic violence.

D. ANNUAL GIRL-LED LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE

"I believe women are capable of achieving what they lay their hands on. The gender inequality that persists between men and women is due to the inaccessibility to equal opportunities in every sector. Be it in ruling a country or any other structure, women have excellent leadership potential. 

COMPOSITION OF PARTICIPANTS IN ANNUAL GIRL-LED CONFERENCE







4. SAFE SCHOOL TRAINING WITH ADOLESCENTS

Adolescents have the right to be protected from all forms of violence, including in their school lives. These age groups are particularly vulnerable to sexual and gender-based violence, if not responded well, can have an effect on their physical, emotional, and cognitive development.



Understanding this, Hamro Palo Team conducted three days long Safe School Training with the adolescents on 17th- 19th June 2022. With the primary objective of enhancing the knowledge of sexual and gender-based violence among the participants and educating them about the use of learning tools and techniques to make schools safe from any form of violence, the training was conducted.

4. SAFE SCHOOL TRAINING WITH ADOLESCENTS

Moreover, the participants were also encouraged to better respond and report violence in school. Also, a close network was created in order to support violence survivors. The training even provided a platform for all the participants to share insights and inputs for designing further programs against sexual and gender-based violence in school.

There were altogether 26 participants from 10 different schools from Kathmandu, Kavrepalanchowk, and Sindhupalchowk consisting of the members of the Girls Advisory Board, Her Turn Leadership Award Winners 2021, graduates of Her Turn and His Chance Graduates and some members of the Child Club.



"Safe School Training helped me to understand that sexual and gender violence can happen to everyone and everywhere. I learned why we need a whole school approach to prevent and respond to the sexual and gender-based violence in and around the schools."

5. WORKSHOP AGAINST CHILD/EARLY MARRIAGE

During lockdown in 2021, the Hamro Palo team conducted a virtual meeting with the Girls Support committee, Girls Advisory Board, and Her Turn graduates to discuss the issues and problems of their communities. The discussion was beneficial as it helped us be aware of the problems that are deeply rooted in the communities and need urgent attention as suggested by the participants. Problems like child marriage and domestic violence were prevalent, and particularly due to the COVID-19 lockdown, there have been increasing cases of child marriage and domestic violence. With the realization of the need to take an intervention, the two-day long workshops against early and child marriage were conducted with the adolescents in three schools of Chautara Sangachowkgadi Municipality.



In the month of September 2022, the workshops were conducted at Shree Jana Jagriti Secondary School which had the participation of 29 students, Shree Seti Devi Secondary School, Thulosirubari having 34 participants and Shree Seti Devi Secondary School, Syaule which had the participation of 27 people.

5. WORKSHOP AGAINST CHILD/EARLY MARRIAGE

Through role plays, documentaries screening, group activities, and energizers, the topics like child marriage, financial literacy, and comprehensive sexuality education were covered in the workshop and provided to the adolescents.

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"My parents are not comfortable talking about sex. If I ever mention sex and sexuality to my parents, they always take it negatively. I thought it was not ethical to talk about sex and sexuality. After this workshop, I understood that it is important for parents to talk about it with their children so as to put an end to all forms of misconceptions in regard to sex and sexuality."

"Before this workshop, I had thought of marrying early and starting a family. I used to think it was necessary to marry and raise a baby early. In this workshop, I got to know about the consequences of early marriage on my physical and mental health, family and society, and financial and social problems arising because of early marriage. The workshop changed my mindset about marriage and now I have decided not to marry at a young age."

6. STRATEGIC PLANNING WORKSHOP

This year, there were two Strategic Planning Workshops that were conducted, one with the Girls Advisory Board in Chautara, Sangachowkgadi and another one with adolescents of eight different schools of Panchkhal Municipality, Kavrepalanchowk. With the primary objective of following up with the Girls Advisory Board 2022 and also exploring the ideas relating to several gender-sensitive and child-friendly programs and collaborative activities that can be done in the coming days, the Strategic Planning Workshop was conducted. Along with this, the workshop helped to brainstorm on the designing and developing of action plans while engaging different stakeholders in alignment with the organization's goals and vision and discussing the ways to make the Girls Support Committee more active.



Through the Strategic Planning Workshop with the Girls Advisory Board, we were able to reach 17 board members and through Strategic Planning Workshop with the adolescents, we were able to work with 39 adolescents from different schools.

6. STRATEGIC PLANNING WORKSHOP

It is commendable that there exist specialized programs such as Her Turn and His Chance Education and Empowerment Program, which are designed to cater to the developmental needs of adolescent girls and boys, respectively. However, it is my belief that a more effective approach could be achieved if a coeducational training program were to be developed and implemented, where both adolescent genders receive training in the same setting.

7. CONFERENCE ON SEXUAL AND GENDER BASED VIOLENCE

It is highly significant that adolescents become aware of sexual and gender-based violence, its forms, its law, and national policies. On 30 July 2022, Hamro Palo collaborated with Nepal Mahila Ekata Samaj, Nepal police's Cyber Bureau, Hami Daju Bhai organization and conducted a one-day conference on Sexual and Gender-based violence-prevention, mitigation, and law at Shree Shivapuri Secondary School, Maharajgunj. In this conference, 54 students of Grades 9 and 10 from 18 different schools participated. All of the participants were from the Kathmandu metropolitan city's community schools.



The conference consisted of a brief panel discussion session by the experts on current laws regarding sexual and genderbased violence, men's role in preventing sexual and genderbased violence, cyber laws of Nepal, and preventing internet crime, bullying, and scams.

7. CONFERENCE ON SEXUAL AND GENDER BASED VIOLENCE

To create a comfortable platform among adolescents to discuss about sexual and gender-based violence openly and make them aware of the ways to better respond and report to Sexual and gender-based violence, Hamro Palo conducted a one-day conference on sexual and gender-based violence at Chautara Sangachok Gadi, Sindhupalchowk on November 2022. At the conference, a total of 53 participants from 13 different schools who are graduates of the Her Turn and His Chance Program participated.

"As a student, I have noticed that our school curriculum focuses on teaching about harmful practices like Jhuma and Deuki, but I am concerned that there are no specific topics related to sexual and gender-based violence. It is essential to have a comprehensive and inclusive curriculum that addresses important social issues that impact our communities today."

8. ROUNDTABLE CONSULTATION ON SEXUAL AND GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE

On 28th December, Hamro Palo organized 'Roundtable Consultation' with like-minded organizations working with women, youth, and children and facilitating interventions to prevent and respond to sexual and gender-based violence, several Kathmandu based public educational institutions undergraduate students from different private educational institutions. This two-hour-long consultation program was held in Lazimpat where there was the active participation of 33 the consultation consisting participants in program representatives different organizations, school from representatives, and undergraduate students from different educational institutions.



It was an honor to have Ms. Nirijana Bhatta, Assistant Manager at CWIN- Nepal (Child Workers in Nepal) and Country Coordinator at Girls Not Brides and Ms. Sulochana Khanal, Program Coordinator at WOREC (Women's Rehabilitation Centre) as the presenters in the roundtable consultation. As the representative of the respective organizations, they shared how CWIN-Nepal and WOREC have been taking interventions to prevent and report sexual and gender-based violence.

8. ROUNDTABLE CONSULTATION ON SEXUAL AND GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE

Their discussion was primarily focused on the presentation of evidence-based reports regarding sexual and gender-based violence, sharing of the knowledge from their years of experiences, and validity. Their presentations were then followed by a discussion with the participants where they provided us with their inputs, insights, and suggestions regarding the prevention of sexual and gender-based violence and also to incorporate them while developing and delivering further programs at different levels.



"Although there is the right to information, there are not enough information centers for adolescents to be informed about the reporting mechanism against SGBV. Moreover, there is still the fear of revictimization among the adolescents due to the lack of information among them."

9. FOLLOW-UP HER TURN AND HIS CHANCE PROGRAM GRADUATES

With the start of the new year in 2022, the Hamro Palo team decided to conduct the follow-up meeting with the graduates of Her Turn and Education His Chance and Empowerment Program of Seti Devi Secondary School, Siddhikamala. The follow-up with the graduates helped the team to monitor and evaluate the effectiveness of the program. Not only this, the team got an opportunity to interact with the graduates to learn about the areas of improvement of the program and the possible ways to support them in the days to come. Moreover, this round follow-up offered ideal of an opportunity for the to team brainstorm the on ideas/interventions that be can executed in the days to come to conduct the programs effectively and efficiently in the future.



10. INTERNATIONAL DAY OF THE GIRL

10.1. Her Turn Leadership Award

Every year, we honor the girls who are passionate about bringing substantial changes in their communities for their leadership, power, and resilience. This year, there were altogether nine adolescent girls who applied for the Her Turn Leadership Award through an open call. Based on their application, the applicants were shortlisted for the phone interview. After the interview, the five best changemakers were selected as the Her Turn Leadership Award Winners.



Marking the 10 years celebration of Her Turn Movement, five girls were honored with certificates and awards by Ms. Ram Kumari Jhakri, Nepalese politician and secretary of CPN (Unified Socialist), a member of the House of Representatives and also the former Minister of Urban Development, in the honor of their contribution as a leader in their community to fight social injustices and create a just and fair society. Their contribution to reducing child marriage cases, domestic violence, gender-based violence, and sexual harassment in their communities is remarkable. Moreover, all the award winners shared their experiences and encouraged other participants to continue to be the changemakers in their community. We are hopeful that their experience will serve as the motivation for other participants to apply and win this award in the coming days.


12. CELEBRATING 10 YEARS OF HER TURN

EDUCATIONAL MATERIALS SUPPORT TO SCHOOLS AND GIRLS

A. Support to the Schools

• School Infrastructure:

A basic school in the uphill village of Jugal Rural Municipality was in much need of school basics such as desks and benches, computers and printers, and other school materials. When the school headteacher reached out to Hamro Palo, we supported all these materials and equipment to reinforce the infrastructure of the school for some 50 students.





Similarly, in the Jumla district, a school had a school building with no adequate washrooms and drinking water for almost 1000 students. Modern, well-equipped washrooms and a drinking water project is underway that will benefit the students of Sita Secondary school in Rara Lihi of Tila Rural Municipality.

• Educational Materials:

Shree Jaldevi Secondary School in Jugal Rural municipality is one of our partner schools for a long time. Over the years, we have conducted various activities including Her Turn and His Chance Education and Empowerment program.

EDUCATIONAL MATERIALS SUPPORT TO SCHOOLS AND GIRLS

This year, we were able to support 10 computers in the school so that students have the experience of learning through practical classes. At Hamro Palo, we understand how important it is to be able to travel and learn. We have seen the confidence boost in adolescents because of travel opportunity. Hence we were able to support the graduates of grades 8 to 10 on their educational tour.

• Learning improvement classes and Child Club:

A school in the suburb of Kathmandu shared how the students in the school need extra classes to improve their learning. This year, we were able to support 10 computers in the school so that students have the experience of learning through practical classes. 
VISIBILITY AND DOCUMENTATION

"Breaking the Cycle of Early/Child Marriage: Advocating for Human Rights and Gender Equality"



Lal Kumari, who is 22 years old, is the eldest daughter of the Shrestha family. Born in Sindhupalchowk, Lal Kumari and her younger sister grew up with their father. Their family, being entirely dependent on agriculture for their survival, do not have a strong income source. Due to several reasons including the poor family background, her younger sister who is now 20 years old got married when she was 14. She is now a mother of a child. Lal Kumari shared emotionally how she could not stop her younger sister from getting married that time. She added up saying she also wanted to get married early thinking the husband would help her fulfill the unmet needs.

But, after joining the Her Turn Program in 2017, she learnt that there are consequences of early marriage to one's own physical, emotional and mental health.



"If I hadn't joined the program that time, I would have already got married like my younger sister.",

says Lalkumari.

Today, along with continuing her undergraduate studies, she is also working as a teacher in the same school she graduated from. She is actively engaged in advocating for women's rights and spreading awareness in the rural families and communities. She is not just the eldest daughter to her father and an elder sister to her elder father, but also an inspiration for other girls like her to prioritize one's own academic and career goals over anything in life.

"Periods Matter: Ending the Shame and Stigma Surrounding Menstruation"

"I still get shivers when I think about my first menstruation. I was only 11 years old when I was forced to leave the comfort of my home and made to sleep in a hut nearby for 15 days. I was forbidden to take part in daily family activities and see the male members of my family. I can't explain the feeling of hopelessness and loneliness that I felt during that period."-says Smriti, 15 years old in an emotional tone.



"I would have been confident to deal with my first menstruation if I had taken Her Turn Program earlier." says Smriti.

Smriti participated in Her Turn Program in 2021. She expressed that the Her Turn Program not only educate her on important issues but also empowered her to implement her learning and take practical steps in life.

In regards to this, Smriti proudly shared how she convinced her parents to not force her younger sister to sleep in a hut during her first menstruation. She expressed with pride that at least her sister didn't have to suffer in a hut like her. Today, the Sapkota family is setting an example for the entire community to stop the menstrual restriction practice. Smriti's journey of fighting for dignified menstruation is indeed commendable and we are extremely proud of her.


